Minutes

Meeting was called to order by acting Chairperson Thom Ellenbecker at 7:03 pm.

March minutes were read and accepted.

A crime report for Forest Hill was presented by Capt. Robert Royster for the past month.

- There were a 1,064 calls for service in the 1st 4 months of 2022.
- In the past month, the most frequent call for service remains alarm calls (45) with suspicious incidents (19) and animal complaints (16) significantly less.
- 2 crashes in the past month (down 50% y/y and an anomaly vs the rest of Harford County where crashes remain up).
- Part 1 crimes down 40% y/y – this month was 1 assault, 1 burglary and 2 thefts.
- Discussed the fatal shooting of an armed, suicidal man in Forest Hill that occurred on 4/23. Two deputies involved remain on leave pending review and are being looked after. Body camera and vehicle camera evidence was preserved. The incident is being investigated by the HCSO, MSP, and the Attorney General's IIU in accordance with laws and policy within the state and body camera footage will not be released until the investigation is complete.

Our guest speaker, Billy Boniface, Chief Advisor for Harford County Executive Barry Glassman, presented the County Executive's proposed 2023 budget.

- Highlights: The \$1.2 budget fully funds education, public safety and other agencies along with a \$0.05 cut in property tax rates.
- Education funding includes \$324.2M operating budget that exceeds Kirwan obligations, includes 7% COLA and 3% Merit increases for teachers/faculty/staff, and \$80.6M for 12 capital projects (including Homestead Wakefield school) and special education buses.
- Law enforcement & safety funding includes 64 new public safety staff positions (including an additional 22 deputies and 18 correctional officers), targets similar 10% raises, begins development of a new central precinct, completes the body camera rollout, and funds opening a portion of the new wing in the detention center.
- Funding for the community college, libraries increased by 10% and 11% respectively.
- \$37M targeted to expanding rural broadband
- \$6M for Ma & PA trail phase 3 (going out to bid this summer, construction 2023 to finish by the end of 2023) and other funding for a Turf field at hickory park, bleacher seating at Tucker field, and a northern regional park.
- General fund income (property tax + income tax) both very strong in 2022 and expected to stay strong. Income tax revenues increased 9%, businesses stayed solvent with no major businesses shuttering from COVID and most businesses reporting they would hire more people if they could find them. Property tax cuts reduce income by \$16M, offset by 2-3% increase in assessed property values county-wide. The budget includes reserves in case these forecasts do not hold.
- Hopeful that the state will restore the 70/30 split of highway funds that is currently in Annapolis → raided in 2008 to be a 88 state / 12 local split.

Other updates from officials & upcoming events

Larry Richardson:

- 3000 bills introduced in state legislative session. 1 more signing session to go, still not clear where key bills will end up:
 - Highway user revenues still alive
 - EMS Medicare reimbursement
 - Board of Education Bills
 - Veteran tax breaks

Aurora Kahoe:

- Developer said “No” to a fence on the church property, recommend letter writing.
- MDOT SHA wants to review study
- New Business -> Wine and Liquor on Newport drive
